Today's topic is Critical Thinking and Mis and Disinformation:

Children today are exposed to more information than at any other time in human history, and it's becoming increasingly difficult to differentiate between facts, opinions, and fiction. So, it's essential that you assist your child to develop the ability to critically assess the information they consume so they don't fall victim to disinformation campaigns or other digital scams.

What is Critical Thinking, Misinformation and Disinformation?

Critical Thinking: Is the ability to analyse, evaluate, and make informed decisions based on the information presented. In relation to digital media, it means being able to question and assess online content to determine its validity before accepting or sharing it.

Misinformation: "False or misleading information that is spread regardless of intent to mislead."

Disinformation: "false, inaccurate, or misleading information designed, presented and promoted to intentionally cause public harm."

Mis and Disinformation can range from fake news articles to manipulated images, and it's often designed to mislead or influence opinions.

Identifying Mis & Disinformation:

Let's have a look at a few examples of disinformation that have been flagged by **Real411.org.za**:




Figure 1: A social media post that was assessed as disinformation by Real411.

In this screenshot, the video is attributed to SABC news, but it also uses a distorted CNN logo. The advertiser manipulates the brand identifiers of credible news sources to spread disinformation that lures users into a fraudulent scam.




Figure 2: A YouTube that was assessed as mis and disinformation by Real411.

A screenshot from a deepfake YouTube advertisement that misleads viewers into believing they can achieve financial success through fraudulent means. Such videos can cause financial harm and erode trust in legitimate investment opportunities. Deepfake technology poses a significant threat as it can be used to create highly convincing fake videos that spread misinformation and deceive viewers.




Figure 3: A social media post on covid-19 related disinformation

As evidenced from the examples above mis & disinformation is designed to look like credible information but is almost always false or misleading and has the potential to cause significant harm.

Children need to be taught how how to spot these tricks:

Look for Red Flags: Teach your child to be suspicious of sensational headlines, spelling and grammar mistakes, shortened website links. These are often signs of disinformation.

Check the Author: Encourage your child to check who wrote the article. Are they a credible journalist or an anonymous source?

Understand the Intent: Help your child understand why 'fake news' exists—often to manipulate opinions, spread fear, or generate clicks for advertising revenue.

Evaluating Online Information

Fact-Checking: Teach your child about the importance of verifying information they find online before accepting it as true. Encourage them to use reliable sources like verified news websites or fact-checking platforms such as <u>africacheck.org</u>

Web Rangers also use the crap test to verify information online:

urrency - How recently has the website been updated?


eliability - Does the creator provide references or sources for data or quotations from reputable sources?

uthority - Who is the creator or author? What is their knowledge and experience on the topic?

urpose/Point of View - Is this fact or opinion? Is it biased?

Cross-Referencing: Help them learn how to cross-reference information by checking multiple sources. If a story or piece of information is true, it should be reported by more than one credible news source.

Essential Insights for Parents: Impact on Children

Media bias happens when information is presented in a way that favours one side or viewpoint over another. Understanding bias is essential for developing critical thinking.

Recognize Different Viewpoints: Teach your child to recognize that news stories can be presented differently depending on the source. Comparing how different media outlets cover the same story can reveal unseen biases.

Identify Personal Bias: Help your child become aware of their own biases and how these might affect their perception of the information.

Question Everything: Encourage a mindset of questioning and curiosity. Teach your child to ask, "Who benefits from this story being told this way?" Particularly when engaging with content on social media platforms.


- Teach children to think critically about online content to avoid misinformation.
